What We Do

We reach out to the unreached population (primarily women and children) in urban and rural slums in Howrah to provide health care facility at their doorstep by means of Mobile Medicare Van and thus ensuring Accessibility, Availability & Affordability of Health care. We consider accessibility to safe drinking water as the basic right of every person in Indian society. We make the life of our beneficiaries at the urban slum of Tikiapara little easier by installing community drinking water purification system with Ultraviolet (UV), Ultrafiltration (UF) and Reverse Osmosis technology. To realise the full potential of our society, we ensure that girls from marginalised community should not drop out from higher education due to financial crunch. We provide financial support to 23 girls from impoverished background and assist them to continue their education.

We encourage women to talk about issues which are considered as taboo. Menstruation is one such issue. We start dialogue with rural community on Menstrual hygiene management, so that women get correct knowledge and break the barriers that are associated with menstruation.

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Impact Created



We had embarked on a journey with a vision to impact the lives of young women and in the years to follow, we can say we have been able to get closer to our goals. With every passing day, more and more females from the marginalized community are attending our mobile medical camps and seeking advice from our qualified doctors. Our scholars are completing their education and taking up jobs at reputed companies across the country. Their stories will inspire others. We had envisioned to break the taboo around menstruation and increase awareness regarding the phenomenon itself and menstrual products and their proper usage. Our KAP(Knowledge, Attitude and Practice) meetings are bringing tiny changes in the lives of young women.

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Mobile Medicare Unit

With Mobile Medicare Unit project, We cater to the population who are medically homeless. We seek to ensure health and well-being for all, at every stage of life. The goal of the project is to address all major health priorities, including reproductive, maternal and child health; communicable, non-communicable and environmental diseases; universal health coverage; and access for all to safe, effective, quality and affordable medicines and vaccines

Although Mobile Medical Van ensured the availability of quality medical service at the doorstep of the community, but soon the need was felt for designing a preventive program for the female beneficiaries. More and more female beneficiaries were attending MMU camps with the complain of UTI (Urinary Tract Infection), Menstrual problems, and it was evident that instead of ensuring steady supply of medicines, awareness regarding menstrual health is the need of the hour.

DITO trained the Community Health Workers on Safe Health and Hygiene Practices, & Menstrual Health and Hygiene. The CHWs paid door to door visit and organized awareness camps and KAP (Knowledge, Attitude, Practice) meetings at various schools, clubs and anganwadi centres.



Access to Safe Drinking Water

Women in India are considered their family's provider for an increasingly valuable material: water. Women are in charge of gathering water every day for use in their homes and on their land. A day's supply of water can amount to multiple trips to a local well for women. While rainfall has remained consistent, India has overused its water, forcing its residents to search beyond their homes for the precious liquid. Indian women must travel longer to find new sources of water, and this affects their lives daily. It might sound weird, that water can be an issue that could keep women and girls out of school, providing for family and a well being that all humans deserve. But that is an undeniable reality for millions of women and girls around the world. Now is the time to take action and increase productivity of women.



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According to the statistics released by the latest census of 2011, India's female literacy rate is 65.46 percent, significantly lower than the world average of 79.7 percent. China, India's neighbor and the other global human resource powerhouse, precedes with 82.7 percent female literacy rate.

In India, the son is always given preference over the daughter, if at all parents try and send them to school. The daughter stays at home and cooks, cleans, and helps her parents in doing the chores, or she might even be employed as a helper somewhere, which is child labour and illegal as per law.

If both the kids are sent to school, and if there is a personal or financial issue where they cannot afford the education of both the kids, it is mostly the daughter who would be first pulled out of the school. The school dropout rate amongst adolescent girls stands high at 63.5%.


If the daughter wants to go for higher studies it becomes a matter of discussion among parents, as it is a well known fact that most indian families spend more on their daughter's wedding when compared to her education.

We live in a society where the upbringing of children still depends largely on the mother. What good are we going to pass on to the next generation if that mother is illiterate?




ESITA BHOWMICK

All I wanted is a job, as early as possible, to support my family financially. I chose Engineering for better possibility of getting a job but the financial condition of my family was not good enough to support my educational expenses. But I didn't loose hope. I came to know about DITO scholarship and decided to go for it . DITO supported my zeal by providing financial support for my education. I am studying in 3rd year, B. Tech. (Textile Technology), at Govt. College of Engineering and Textile Technology. My SGPA score is 8.92 (4th Sem) .

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


I am from a business family. Unfortunately our family business was in a bad shape. My father also has a lots of financial liabilities to attend to. Despite all odds I completed my secondary and higher secondary examination with flying colors. After my higher secondary examination, I got admission at B.Tech (Electronics and Computer Engineering) at Bengal Institute of Technology. My family did not have that financial strength to support my education for a longer period of time. I am thankful to the almighty that I have got DITO to support my education. I am now a student of 3rd year. I scored SGPA of 8.42 in my 4th sem examination.



I am from Jiaganj, Murshidabad. My father works in a Private company, mother is a housewife. My family has many financial burdens. My mother provides financial support for my education through her earnings from private tutions. I always wanted to pursue my study in Engineering to create a niche for myself and my family. But for me it was an impossible dream. DITO made it possible through their unconditional support for my education. I am a student of B.Tech, 3rd Year. My SGPA score of 5th semester was 8.04.





My father is a transport worker and my mother is a housewife. I and my elder sister do private tuitions to support our family as well as our education. Our family lives in a small rented flat of Howrah city slum. Like other striving girl in our community, I too had a dream to pursue my career in Engineering for better job prospects. But the educational expenses of Engineering is huge, and for a family with limited financial capabilities, is impossible to achieve. DITO appear to me as a saviour I applied for their scholarship and got selected. DITO is supporting me to achieve my dreams. I am a student of B.Tech (Electronics and Computer Engineering), Bengal Institute of Technology, Final Year. My SGPA was 8.67 in 8th Semester examination and my YGPA is 8.42.



My father is a daily labour and my mother is housewife. I have got two elder brothers who were separated from the family. Due to the financial condition in my family that put restraint in almost in every activities, our education suffered the most. I made up my mind to break the financial shackles and support my family. I pursued my education diligently, came out in flying colors in my higher secondary examinations and appeared for medical entrance examinations. Allthough i got an admission, pursuing the course had become almost impossible due to thefinancial conditions. My family is already under tremendous financial stress and they still managed my admission fees. I came to know about DITO scholarship and applied for it. I got selected and now I am a student of 3rd Year, MBBS, Calcutta Medical College. I scored 59% in my last examinations.





NAGHMA KHATOON

I belong to an economically constrained Indian family. My father is a daily wage earner and my mother is a housewife. I have a supportive family that has the desire to help me reach the goal of becoming a doctor. My father is doing his best to support me as well as my sisters by working the best of his abilities. But my family lack the financial strength necessary to fulfill their desire. I needed financial help to reach my goal of becoming self sufficient. DITO came to know about the situation and asked me to apply for the scholarship. Presently, I am pursuing my graduation in science and at the same time preparing for medical entrance examination.



KEHKASAN PARVEEN

It was really difficult for my parents to meet my educational expenses after supporting the family expenses. My father is a roadside vendor and my mother is a house wife. My family live by hand to mouth. It was indeed a challenge to continue my education under the circumtances but I was up to it. I scored 379 out of 500 in my higher secondary examination and got admission in BTech (Electrical), MCKV College of Engineering. My family was under tremendous financial stress but my mother did not hesitate to mortgage her jewelry for my admisssion fees. DITO supported me when I was in dire need of financial help to continue my education. I am now at 4th Year. My SGPA was 7.93 in my 7th semester examinations.



"I come from a low income family in Paschim Putiary, Kolkata. My family was living on my father's meagre pension of Rupees 2000/month till my brother left his studies to support our family by earning Rupees 5000 a month. Within such financial hardships, I still managed to do very well in my exams and take admission in BSc (Nutrition) in Calcutta University. But I did not want my education to be a burden on my brother. This is when I found DITO scholarships. At first, I was hesitant about the scholarship. I thought my profile would not be accepted. But it came as my best friend and approved the entire cost of my education. I am forever indebted. I have already taken admission in MSc at Indian Institute of Engineering Science & Technology. I need scholarship to continue my studies and also a part time job to ease the pain of my family."



"I come from a remote village in Murshidabad called Bhalkundi. My family - my mother is a housewife and my father a construction laborer. My family used to depend on my father's meagre salary. Things changed drastically when my father got married elsewhere and abandoned us, and soon after even my mother got married to someone else. Within extreme poverty, I had to come face to face with emotional and psychological upheaval. My maternal grandfather then came to my aid. Thanks to the support I got from him and my teachers, I managed to do well in my studies and got admission in a premier institution like Jadavpur University for my M.A. in Philosophy. With the help of DITO's scholarship, I have passed my M.A. exam successfully and am looking forward to continue my studies by doing my M.Phil. Hopefully, I will be able to continue my studies even further and do a PhD from a university of repute."





One year back DITO has undertaken a pilot study to gain an insight into the menstrual hygiene management practices of the women and young girls in randomly selected 3 villages of Uluberia - II block (Kamalachowk, Basudevpur and Jagarampur) of Howrah district. The key findings of the survey are

62% (108) said they use cloth as a menstrual absorbent; only 36% (64) use sanitary napkins. Strikingly 2% (3) refused to share anything about their menstrual habit.


69% (75) of cloth users refused to share how they dry their menstrual cloth, remaining 31% (33) cloth users shared they dried it in the sunlight.

82% (53) napkin users shared they tend to throw the napkin in any available open space; only 14% (9) napkin users said they wrap and throw the napkin in garbage vat

99% (174) shared they did not visit a temple or participated in any religious activity during menstruation.

Based on the findings of the baseline survey, DITO submitted a proposal to the P&RD department, proposing awareness meetinga and advocacy camps with the help of local Anganwadi workers at Uluberia-II block. After obtaining permission from the P&RD department, 32 Anganwadi workers were chosen for the master training on Menstrual Health and Hygiene. These 32 Anganwadi workers are replicating the same training at their centers for the community people. The plan was to reach 39505 rural female population residing at 36 villages of Uluberia-II block.

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Lets break the Silence around Menstruation

A social experiment conducted by DITO



As part of an ongoing project on Community Health & Menstrual Hygiene Management, a flash mob on menstrual health and taboos was organized at prominent places of Kolkata like CTC Bus Terminus, Explanade, Academy of Fine Arts, Rabindra Sadan, & Tollygunge Metro.

The performance began with a bunch of boys and girls shaming a girl on periods for her stained skirt. 14 students and professionals, all part of a theater group named Dramatically Correct participated in this 15 minute play.

During DITO's 3 year journey in serving the community, it was found that menstruation is still a taboo, not only in rural parts of Bengal, but also in a metro city like Kolkata and its suburbs. Unwillingness to talk about the irregularity of menstruation is leading 40% of the female beneficiaries to unwanted health hazards.

We are still a part of the society where 71% of the 35.5 crore menstruating women in the country have not heard the term MENSTRUATION before their menarch and less than 15% use sanitary pads due to the menstrual taboos.

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Flash mob breaks hygiene taboo

A girl walks down Esplanade in a stained skirt. She asks ind statued skirt. She asks passersby for a sanitary nap-kin or the way to the nearest medical store. Women pedestri-ans are quick to offer her ad-vice or directions, most men are unwilling to even talk to her.

Esplanade: A flash mob near the CTC bus stop in Esplanade on Wednesday afternoon caught passersby mawares with a street play on menstrual health and the taboos associated withit.

The performance began with a bunch of boys and girls shaming the girl for her stained skirt. Soon, a crowd gathered around the artistes.

"This play was needed. Our girls must learn to talk," said Rekha Eanerjee, who had offered the girl with the stained skirt her shaw!

An initiative of social welfare organisation DITO, the play was part of an ongoing project to spread menstrual awareness and save women from crosstrehalth hazards. Esplanade: A flash mob near

"We have been operating a mobile medical unit for women in several neighbourhoods of Howrah, including Tidapara, Chusuri, Munsirhat and the area around Betanic Garden since last year. Consultation with gynaccologists revealed how irregular periods and the

per cent of urban women use sanitary pads.

"We started conducting community awareness programmes to change mindsets among adolescents. We would find many teenagers being harassed for resisting the forced isolation they were subjected to during periods. This is the first time we have collaborated with a theatre group to spread the message. Art has a greater impact," Blowmick said.

The play was put up by 14 students and professionals, all members of Dramatically Correct. "We have worked on health issues in the past but this subject was new for us. I faced no hostility but the response of the audience was lukewarm compared with our other plays. That shows menstruation is still considered a struction and weneed to raise





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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

TO THE MEMBERS OF DITO SOCIAL WELFARE ASSOCIATION

Report on the Audit of Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of DITO Social Welfare Association ("the Company") which comprises the Balance Sheet as at March 31, 2019, the Income and Expenditure Account, and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the aforesaid financial statements give the information required by the Companies Act 2013("Act") in the manner so required and give a true and fair view in conformity with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, of the state of affairs of the Company as at March 31, 2019, its surplus and cash flows for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing (SAs) specified under section 143(10) of the Companies Act, 2013. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the Code of Ethics issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements under the provisions of the Act and the Rules thereunder, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion on the financial statements.



Information other than the financial statements and auditors' report thereon

The Company's board of directors is responsible for the preparation of the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Annual Report, but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained during the course of our audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibility of Management and those charged with governance for the Financial Statements

The Company's Board of directors are responsible for the matters stated in section 134 (5) of the Act with respect to the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of the Company in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the accounting standards specified under section 133 of the Act.

This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records in accordance with the provisions of the Act for safeguarding of the assets of the Company and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statement that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The Board of Directors/those charged with governance are also responsible for overseeing the company's financial reporting process.

Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

In conducting our audit, we have taken into account the provisions of the Act, the accounting and auditing standards and matters which are required to be included in the audit report under the provisions of the Act and the Rules made there under and the Order issued under Section 143(11) of the Act.

We conducted our audit of financial statements in accordance with the Standards on Auditing specified under Section 143(10) of the Act. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

As part of an audit in accordance with SAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
 procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances. Under section 143(3)(i) of the

F Revenue recognition
